

## From the Minister's Desk

Dear Friends,

"It is surely a fact of inexhaustible significance that what our Lord left behind Him was not a book, nor a creed, nor a system of thought, nor a rule of life, but a visible community... He committed the entire work of salvation to that community... The actual visible community, a company of men and women with ascertainable names and addresses, is the Church of God." These words were written by one of the foremost missionary thinkers and writers of the twentieth century, Leslie Newbigin. Take time to read that quote again and ponder it for a minute before you read on. These words have helped me to understand two things more clearly.

First of all, God is at work in the world through His Church. We hear so much negative publicity about the Church, that its membership is falling, that it is no longer relevant to a post-modern society like ours. But Newbigin would remind us that the Lord Jesus Christ left His Church behind Him and committed to His Church the mission of salvation. God is still at work in His Church and through His Church. God has not gone away; the gospel has not become out-dated; God is still at work in us and through us and people are still coming to faith in Jesus as they hear the good news proclaimed by the Christian Church.

We should not write off the Church and consign it to the rubbish bin. Tom Nairn's famous remark about the day coming when the last minister of the Church of Scotland would be strangled by the last copy of the *Sunday Post* will not happen. The Church will change, but the Church will always exist. That's a reason to be encouraged and to rejoice that God is still at work in our world, in our Church and through us in our community.

The second lesson that Newbigin's quote has etched on my mind is the notion that the Church is a company of people "with ascertainable names and addresses", real people, living in the real world. The Church is not some nebulous, indefinable 'entity' that exists here or there or

across the world. The Church is a group of people who live in your street and mine and who look to follow Jesus Christ in their real world.

When we read the statistics of Church and the falling membership rolls, remember each statistic is a real person. Those lost to membership represent people who have died, or who have drifted away from Church or may even have given up their faith. Those new to the Church, or restored to membership are individuals who have found faith in Jesus Christ or have reconnected to Church. Either way, each statistic represents an individual story of grace and faith, or of struggle and hardship.

I had the privilege, in May, of conducting 2 special services. The first was at the beginning of the month, when four young women professed their faith in public for the first time and became members of the Church. Their 'ascertainable names and addresses' were added

to our membership roll. The second service was at the end of May, when we ordained seven new elders; you can read more about this elsewhere. Their names and addresses were added to our leadership list, taking on new responsibility in the life of the Church.

All of this makes me see very clearly the 'connectedness' of Church. In our evening service a few weeks ago we spoke about the connectedness Paul felt to the Thessalonian Christians and how he longed to see them and be with them again. That connectedness was based on a shared faith in Jesus, a shared commitment to Christ and the gospel, and in their case perhaps, a shared experience of persecution. They expressed that connectedness by being concerned for one another, looking to encourage one another and 'buttress' one another's faith and by praying for one another. Don't lose that sense of connectedness to other Christians, in our own congregation here, or to the Church in the city, Scotland or across the world. Be concerned for one another, encourage others, pray for each other.

## THE VISIT OF CHOMNO

On May 11<sup>th</sup> we had the enormous privilege of a visit from Chomno, the leader of the Cambodia Hope Organization in Poipet, a city on the Cambodia-Thailand border; he and his wife Kim visited Scotland in May. He spoke



movingly in the morning service about his own experience in the 1970's in the Killing Fields times and of his Christian faith. In the evening he told the story of CHO, of the way in which the organization was begun and the work that it now does in helping the poor of Poipet. There are copies of Chomno's evening talk in the Church vestibule if you would like to read it again. We gave him some gifts: a tile of the Church, a JG300 recipe book and a copy of a photograph taken during the morning service; we also collected over £1000 (\$2108) which was collected over the time of his visit and gave it to him for the work of CHO.

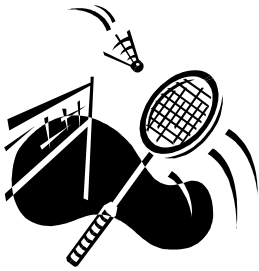


## HALLS CLEANING REPORT

## JGPC Youth

*"Let the little children come to me, and do not hinder them, for the kingdom of God belongs to such as these."*

One of the greatest privileges and pleasures for me in recent years has been to see the way that we, as a church, have started to adapt our youth provision to meet the changing, and wide-ranging, needs of young people.

The first way that I saw this happening was, not long after I joined the youth group here, in 2001, when they started going to Powerpoint, a monthly event, where about 400 young people from across Scotland come together to worship God, explore what it means to be a Christian and meet other young Christians.

More recently, we have seen two new groups established to meet the needs of young people in Juniper Green. Rock Solid, our club for primary school children, meets fortnightly on Fridays during term time providing games, crafts and bible stories while at the other end of the age spectrum, we have MSM, for young people S4+, which meets twice a month during term time and provides an opportunity to meet together as a group of young Christians and discuss in a informal setting some of the issues we encounter regarding our faith.

These newer groups and activities work alongside our existing youth provision, Crèche, Beginners, Kid's Church and Youth Group, to meet the changing spiritual needs of our young people.

We also want to encourage youth involvement in Church services and one way we are doing this is by having a morning worship led by the Youth Group and MSM, on Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> June, which both groups are currently working with Jim to prepare. I would encourage you all to come to this as it promises to be an excellent event.

The group is known as **Rock Solid**. There is much enthusiasm and competition; the atmosphere is happy, lively and energetic and, most importantly, the children are interested and eager to listen and learn.

Each summer, during the last week of the school holidays, there is a **Summer Mission** for primary school children. In recent years, around 80 children have come along to enjoy the activities, encouraged by 20+ adults and teenagers who give up their time for this opportunity to teach the children that Church can be fun; the kids just wouldn't come along if it wasn't!!

Again, during term time, every Wednesday at lunchtime in Juniper Green Primary School, there is a Scripture Union meeting for the Children of Primary 6 and Primary 7. This is organised and run by two members of our congregation with the blessing and encouragement of the school's Headmistress. There is also a Scripture Union meeting held at the senior school, Currie Community High school.

Is it not encouraging that, thanks to the band of faithful and dedicated helpers, many youngsters in the Juniper Green area hear the word of God, which is the same every day of the week, not just Sundays. These youngsters are the future of the church and all these activities surely should be nurtured. Not only the children but also all the leaders and helpers deserve all our support, encouragement, gratitude and prayers.
