





From the Minister's Desk

Dear Friends,

A man was sitting beside the canal. He was 30 years old, the very time in his life when all the hopes and aspirations with which he had grown up, should be coming true. To him, it felt as if all these hopes and aspirations had gone. The canal was in a foreign country and he was there living in exile, forced to move because his home city had been captured. With his family and friends, he mourns all that he has lost and his captors make fun of him.

At 30, he should have been joining the priesthood. His father had been a priest in the Temple and his son should have been following in father's footsteps. But the temple is destroyed in the same attack that had turned him into a prisoner. Now the hope of becoming a priest is something in the past, never to be realised. In fact, he is not even sure that God is there any more; there is a real doubt in his mind that God has gone away and deserted His people in the trauma of exile.

This man's name is Ezekiel. At the age of 30, when he should have been becoming a priest, God called him to become a prophet, someone who would speak to the people with God's word. As part of that calling and ministry, Ezekiel is given some fantastic visions (and some disturbing ones!) to pass on to the people of Israel living in exile.

For Israel the golden days were gone, the days when David and Solomon were on the throne and Israel was a real power and influence in the Middle East. This decay had taken generations to work through, with kings who had ignored God and disobeyed Him. All the traditions and important places were gone: the temple is destroyed and worship is ended. All their hopes had been superficial, that somehow a new political alliance or the Temple building itself would be enough to save them. It hadn't worked and they were beaten, lost in exile, strangers in a foreign land.

There are some themes here that resonate with me as I look at the Church in Scotland today. For the Church in Scotland the golden days are gone and our influence in society is in sad decline. There was a time when around 1.5 million Scots were members of the Church of Scotland and Scottish culture revolved around the Church and what the Church said. The statistics show membership of 432,000 and

there are so many other voices to which people listen in Scotland in 2012.

The decline which is now so obvious to us has been working its way through the Church for years. At times, we have simply ignored this decline and hoped that it would go away; at other times, the solutions we have tried have been superficial without really getting to the heart of the matter. Deep down, we have wondered whether God has gone away and we have been left to flounder along on our own in an increasing secular world.

Ezekiel discovered that God had not gone away. The whole theme of his ministry as a prophet was that God was still king, that God still had His people in His hands. There were difficult times ahead, but they were to approach these times in faith, trusting the goodness and grace of God, even in exile. God was with His people to bless them; they were to keep the faith alive.

They learned lessons from their exile.

They learned a new way to worship; they learned to listen for the word of God through its preachers; they learned not to give in to their fears; they learned not to despise the day of small things, but see that God sometimes begins in small ways; they learned to repent of their faults and mistakes and their past lack of faith. Above all, they learned that God was there, with them; he had not gone away, but was still King and was still the Saviour of His people.

What are your hopes and aspirations for your Church? Do you think that God has left you? That the Church is down the tubes no matter what we do? I believe that God is still at work in our Church and community; I see evidence of that. But I also believe that we have huge challenges ahead of us and that we will have to learn some of these 'exile-lessons'. Perhaps we need to learn to worship in a new way; we certainly need to listen for God's word in a new way. Let's not give in to our fears, but have a sense of confidence in Jesus who is our Saviour. Let us repent of our faults and mistakes and our past lack of faith. Above all, let us keep a sense of the presence of God; God has not gone away; love Him, trust Him, serve Him.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Financially, our situation is not as good at the moment in comparison to last year. There are a number of reasons for this:

- we have maintenance costs of £5,200 for our organ to pay.
- our annual cost for ministries and mission expenditure has increased by £7,664.
- our income for halls rent is down (as we knew it would be) because we are less than the £5,000 we received last year from the rental from a local children's nursery.
- we received legacies amounting to £6,000 last year.
- our Givings are slightly down on last year.

These are all the reasons why we should think seriously about how much we give to the church on an annual basis. We give in many other ways too, but the end result is to ensure that we are able to be a self-sufficient congregation that pays its ministries and mission allocation in full, improves the upkeep of the fabric of our buildings and provides help to other deserving causes (we have already donated £3,000 to Scripture Union this year).

Indeed, many churches throughout Scotland will be in the same situation as ourselves, and that is why the Church of Scotland instructed that a National Stewardship Campaign should take place this year. You will remember from the last Church News that we have decided to give our campaign the title '**Giving is Gracious**'.

So what has happened since I mentioned it in March last year. Well, not very much because my plea for assistance fell on stony ground – I think I have three helpers at present. But also because the main thrust of our campaign will be at the end of September. However, that does not stop you increasing your Givings now!

In September we have arranged three times when I hope we will meet together to review what we have done to date and make plans for the future. It will not be all about money but a time to get to know each other better, to find out what is of interest to others and to enjoy being together as a church family. Once again, I will summarise what our campaign will be about and I only ask that you take part in at least some part of it.

- 1) On Saturday 22nd September we will host an Afternoon Tea for those in our congregation and community who are elderly, infirm, who may be living alone and don't get out much, or who would like to meet with others they perhaps have not seen for some time. Entertainment has been arranged and I am sure it will be a most enjoyable event. Some help will be required to organise this afternoon so please let me know if you can help.
- 2) On Saturday 29th September we will hold a Gift Day. In the morning please come along to the church hall with a monetary gift and/or with examples of your talents. These could be paintings, baking, knitting, flower arranging, artwork, writing, music, etc. These will be exhibited and, if you wish, sold as a donation to the church. This morning requires a small team to set it up as a unique event in the context of '**Giving is Gracious**' and if you would like to be part of the team, please let me know.
- 3) On the evening of 29th September, we will be organising an Evening Meal provided by Irene Shepherd followed by some entertainment. Tickets will be available at a cost of £10 in early August but put this date in your diary now.

I have been the Church Treasurer for quite a few years now and I have always been encouraged by the response from the congregation whenever there has been a need for raising funds for a special project, just for on-going maintenance costs or a stewardship campaign. I have never been disappointed at the results we have achieved over the years and I know that this year will be no different. So let's make it a happy and successful time for us all.

Finally, I refer you to James, Chapter 2 verses 17 & 18. "In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead. But someone will say, 'You have faith: I have deeds.' Show me your faith without deeds, and I will show you my faith by what I do"

Let's keep up the good work!

Session Notes - May/June 2012

Sometimes I hear people talking about Presbytery in terms of 'them'; what do 'they' do; who are these people; why should we do what they ask; and so on in similar vein? The answers to these questions are broadly similar to what we might say to members asking about our own Kirk Session. Under our Presbyterian system, Presbytery is a court of the church with democratically appointed members. For instance, Edinburgh Presbytery comprises all parish Ministers matched by a representative Elder from each parish church.

That means that Ministers and Elders are in equal number so that power does not lie with one group. However, Edinburgh is one of the Presbyteries with quite a number of non-parish Ministers such as Associate/Assistant Ministers; retired Ministers, Ministers lecturing at Edinburgh University, Chaplains, Ministers on the staff of 121 George Street, etc. So that the balance of Minister and Elder members is maintained additional Elders are appointed – these are called Freely Elected Elders or balancing Elders. That means that some Churches have more than one Elder on Presbytery.

At a recent Kirk Session meeting we were pleased to reappoint Douglas Buchanan as our Representative Elder and I continue as a Freely Elected Elder. Each member of Presbytery is expected to support Presbytery's work through its committee structures. Douglas brings his financial expertise to the work of the Finance Committee – I continue as Convener of the Superintendence Committee.

Presbytery is not a body of unelected members holding pointless meetings and issuing wearisome edicts to local Churches. It is a court one step up from our own Kirk Session and one step below the General Assembly. Its responsibilities are many and include Finance, Mission Resourcing, Superintendence, Social and Community interests, Ministries, Deployment of Resources, Doctrine, Pastoral Care, Planning, Property, World Mission, and Strategy.

One of Presbytery's biggest pieces of recent work was the production of the Plan for Presbytery. The Plan determines much of what will happen regarding the deployment of

Ministers (more would be nice) across the Presbytery and the future of buildings (we have too many). Our own Session raised no objections to the Plan as our own Church and our nearest neighbours all have independent futures for the next ten years. I doubt that I'll still be on Presbytery in 2022 so other democratically appointed people will determine the shape of the Church in Edinburgh at that time!

Easter and more... the passion walk



Holy week is a time of the year I look forward to. I take great spiritual nourishment from our shared services up and down the valley and spending time with our Christian neighbours in Currie and Balerno. However, this year I had more. This year I joined in 'the passion walk' organised by some very special people who work at the Emmaus House in Edinburgh. The walk set off from Greyfriars Kirk and took me on a journey of 5 miles from the Castle to Holyrood, over Salisbury Crags through the Meadows and on to Gilmore Place where refreshments were waiting.

We each had the benefit of recorded reflections to listen to at specific points along the walk. The recordings varied from choral music and poetry to readings of reflective works. These reflections focused my mind on parts of the Easter story I know so well but brought me to an entirely new understanding of it. I walked down closes I had never been in and saw corners I barely knew and throughout Jesus' presence was absolute and personal. I was aware of others walking the same walk with their minds focused on the passion and it brought Jesus so completely into my city. I was also aware of others walking the same walk in complete oblivion to my experience beside them.

I gained from the whole experience, but two elements stay soundly in my memory.

I stood on the crags looking over my dreary dreich city and listened to the reflection on the crucifixion. I wept and wondered what Jesus makes of us.

At the end of my walk I was given directions to the chapel in the garden of Emmaus House. This chapel would have been bought in the garden centre as it's a wooden shed. My experience there was utter and complete closeness to Jesus. He is where we open our hearts to Him.

If you get the opportunity I deeply encourage you to take part in this walk another year. The whole event was well planned and we were very well cared for. The possibility of experiencing our city in a very different and profoundly moving way is wonderful.


