

From the Minister's Desk

Dear Friends,

Here's a story from *Beyond the Good Samaritan* by Ann Morisy. It is all about what we do and why we do it.

I used to call in at a second-hand shop run by the church in a former mining community, the shop was like a permanent jumble sale, with second-hand clothes and bric-a-brac and mugs of tea and coffee for anyone who wanted them. The most significance place in the shop was around the open fire, where people would sit and chat and put the world to rights.

As part of a review of the shop's 'mission', people were asked to say what was the most important thing to them about the shop. Almost without exception they said it was being able to sit around the fire chatting, this led to the next question: why was the fire so important? Some said it brought back happy memories of their family sitting around the fire enjoying the warmth and the conversation. They were asked why that didn't happen now and the response came back that there was no one to sit around with at home any more. Why was this? Because people had left, leaving only the 'old timers' in the town.

The questions were posed 'Who lights the fire each morning?' and 'who stokes the fire?' It was the men who did this and they were the ones who would stand in front of the fire to warm themselves. Did all the men do this? No, only the regulars; it would be presumptuous of a newcomer to poke the fire and put more coal on. Why was it the men who took responsibility for the fire? Because that's all they're good for, came the half-mocking response from the women in the group. Why is it that this is all that the men do? From here the discussion came alive, it was no longer a quaint insight into the mores of a mining community. The discussion took account of the pit closures and the sense of uselessness which the men felt. How everything about the town had gone downhill. How anyone with anything about them had moved, and those who were left were either old or 'good-for-nothings'. And no, the shop which the church ran didn't help very much either: what sort of man wants to fold second-hand clothes and arrange bric-a-brac?

The responses to those questions changed the 'mission' of the shop. The church took over a warehouse and set up a community café. This new stage in the project's life would give plenty of jobs that both men and women felt able to do. There were vans to drive for the house clearance business. There was furniture restoration. Wardrobes and beds to deliver to needy families close by, as well as at the other end of the county. A skilled eve to develop in order to know what to send to auction and what to put on the bric-a-brac counter. The Church saw that the emphasis on recycling was not limited to material goods; it was people who were being salvaged as well.

In this little story, the shop's focus changed: it had started life as a place where people came to buy things, but it had changed subtly into a place where people met to chat and put the world to rights. When people recognised that the community had changed and that the shop's purpose had changed, they changed the way they did things.

Like it or not, life has changed incredibly. My 3-year old grandson has already learned how to work computer technology, the first generation growing up with that technology as a fact of life. 50 years ago, communication was by a telephone attached to the wall and connected by the operator. People got their information about the world through the newspapers and on the radio; grainy television pictures were just beginning, but we only learned about things that had happened on the day after. Now, everyone has a phone in his pocket and news in on television or on the tablet twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week, and so often we watch it as it happens!

Community has changed because lifestyle has changed. 50 years ago, nothing much happened on a Sunday; this Sunday, families will do swimming lessons, ski-ing lessons, shopping, football and rugby coaching. Lots of people go to work early and finish late.

How does the church communicate the good news of Jesus in this kind of world? How does the Church create a space for people to chew the fat and set the world to rights? How does the Church help people to find faith in Jesus and then help that faith to grow? How does the Church give people the space to worship God in a busy, cluttered world? Answers on a postcard...

TREASURER'S REPORT

The General Treasurer of the Church of Scotland wrote to us earlier this year to thank us for our Ministries and Mission contribution for this year which amounts to £63,760. He also wished to inform us how this contribution would be spent which I now detail below.

Ministries (86%): £54,834 of our total contribution will go towards the costs of providing over 1,000 ministers and other parish workers in communities throughout Scotland and in the Presbytery of England. This contribution also assists with the costs of recruitment and training. The 2013 cost of a parish minister at the top of the stipend scale is £39,895 (stipend plus employer's national insurance and pension contributions). As our contribution to Ministries is above this figure, our church is meeting the full cost of our ministry and supporting other congregations.

(14%): £8,926 Mission of our total contribution will be used to support the Church's work in: resourcing congregations Christian education and outreach; providing social care services in Christ's name to further the caring work of the Church to people in need; accompanying partners around the world on our shared Christian journey; contributing the Church's opinion in public debate and on issues affecting Scotland and the World; providing central day-to-day service work in administrative, financial and legal matters; and in planning the General Assembly and in ensuring the Moderator represents the Church.

As you will see, the contribution our church makes ensures a very diverse ministry is maintained and that the Gospel of Jesus Christ is shared in many ways and in many places.

National Stewardship Campaign: As approved by last year's General Assembly, the aspect of Stewardship should be on our agenda every year and managed in the three-year cycle of Money, Talents and Time. Last year our campaign 'Giving is Gracious' was most successful, centred on both money and talents. We hope our campaign this year, 'Time for Giving', will be just as positive – with your help – and therefore we have decided to make use of the formula that seemed to work so well last year.

In September we have again arranged three times when I we hope we will meet together

to look at ways that we can give more of our time to the church and to each other. This year it will not be about money but a time to get to know each other better, to find out what people can do to help others and to enjoy being together as a church family. I will summarise what our campaign will be about and I only ask that you join with us in at least some part of it.

- 1) On Saturday 21st September we will host an afternoon tea for those in our congregation and community who are elderly, infirm, who may be living alone and don't get out much, or who would like to meet with others they perhaps have not seen for some time. Entertainment has been arranged and I am sure it will be a most enjoyable event.
- 2) On Saturday 28th September we will hold a **Time for Giving** Day. In the morning please come along to the church hall where those who are able may choose to give just a little bit more of their time to the church and others will give of their time to help other members by volunteering their time with the skills that they have. It could be reading, painting, gardening, legal matters, financial help, etc.
- 3) On the evening of 28th September, we will be organising an evening meal provided by Irene Shepherd followed by some entertainment. Tickets will be available at a cost of £12 in early August but put this date in your diary now.

Throughout my term as your Church Treasurer I have always been encouraged by the response from you whenever there has been a need for raising funds and I am pleased to say that we are presently in a reasonable financial position. However, we must not be complacent as there is much work needed to our buildings to bring them up to modern day standards. For this reason, for meeting our quite substantial Ministries and Mission contribution and our own Mission commitments, your annual review of your giving to the church is appreciated.

Finally, from Hebrews, Chapter 13 verse 16: "And do not forget to do good and to share with others, for with such sacrifices God is pleased."

The third Men's Fellowship meeting for 2012/13 met on Sunday 24 February 2013. The speaker, after the breakfast, was Gordon McFadzean with the topic "Worship - True or False". Gordon's talk highlighted different worship forms of praise using CD's and his experiences of praise music, namely Free Church of Scotland, Gregorian Chant, Russian Church Music, Traditional Maronite Chant (Syrian Christian Music), and Musica Sancta Jerusalem (Monastery of Resurrection in Abu Gosh at Emmaus). His journey highlighted that he felt a part of the different worship experiences, although the language and form of worship was different from say the Kirk, and these experiences were an encouragement and a blessing in his faith journey.

His talk prompted thoughts of other worship music like Taize during the discussion. Further examples of Christian music from other traditions can be easily found on the Web.

A Men's Dinner took place in the new Clubhouse of Baberton Golf Club on 11 April 2013. The after-dinner speaker was David Dewhurst, Director of Finance of EMMS International (formerly Edinburgh Medical Missionary Society), on the topic "Work of EMMS International", an Edinburgh based Christian organization going back to 1841. David explained the historical background to "EMMS" with emphasis on medical aid to foreign countries, currently India, Malawi, and Nepal. "EMMS" gives financial support on a project basis in the form of healthcare partnerships in poorest parts of the world to assist in transforming lives by improving life chances and by sharing Christian faith in works and actions. Health challenges mentioned by David included hiv/aids, malnutrition, malaria, and poverty. Following David's talk a period of discussion brought out the role of "EMMS" including a recent visit by David to a hospital in northern India. At the end of the evening, all present had learned about the role of "EMMS" and its many challenges.

The final Breakfast Meeting of the 2012/13 Session is planned for 9 June 2013. The speaker will be John Christy and his topic "My Faith Journey".

The amazing power of the Lord

This story is an incredible but true one. In April, a house in the Baberton area was broken into and burgled one Saturday night when the owners mistakenly left a downstairs window open when painting. Suffice to say a small amount of high value goods was taken and packed into a rucksack the man of the house uses for work. The amazing thing is that although the thief emptied the rucksack before he used it, he failed to remove a Bible the owner kept in it. He and his wife joked that maybe the thief would feel contrition when he came across it.

Well he did. Having reported the break in on Sunday first thing and having had the police at their home for much of the morning, imagine the owners' surprise when their doorbell was rung at 6.15pm on the Sunday night by the thief who had come to confess all and hand himself in to the police. He gave back all the items that he had stolen except for the Bible which, if the owner didn't mind, he wanted to keep.

The man was in quite a distressed state, said he had been drinking the previous night, had broken into their house and stolen goods but had woken up in the afternoon of the following day remembering what he had done and feeling full of guilt. He had written a personal letter of apology which he handed to the owners. They invited him in and gave him a coffee and the lady of the house started to cook him a meal after she had 'phoned for the police. The police then arrived, stormed the house but were amazed to find the man sitting having a cup of coffee with the owner while his wife was cooking a meal for the distressed man.

It turned out there was a warrant out for his arrest already. He was quite tearful and distressed with himself and 'wanted' to go to jail. But he was very pleasant and the owners actually felt quite sorry for him. He had dressed himself as smartly as he could before he came back to the house including putting on a tie. The police were incredulous and said they hadn't come across a situation like this in all their years combined service. It seems most unusual. Was the power of the Lord at work through the Bible? The owners think it was and hope God's word will continue to help the man who now has the Bible as his own.

CHILDREN'S HOLIDAY CLUB


